



**SAMUEL ETO'O**



His name is Samuel Eto'o Fils. He comes from Cameroon. He was born in Nikon on March 10 in 1981 and he is now 26 year old. His nickname is Electronic Toe.

Samuel Eto'o Fils made an impact on the world of football while he was still a teenager. He has exceptional physical qualities and made the leap to European football at the tender age of just 16 when Real Madrid signed him up and loaned him out to second division Leganés. At the age of 17 years and 3 months he became the youngest player in the 1998 World Cup in France and was the only player who had been born in the '80's.

His sport behaviour is impressive. I admire him because he is friendly to other players and he knows how to communicate with other players. He is also psychically a hard player, which means that insults don't finish him down and if you destroy him psychically, he explodes. I think that every player has a limit and if you cross that limit, then everybody reacts a little bit aggressive.

He has problems with racists. One of the players in another team insulted him and Eto'o decided to go into the dressing room because the referee didn't protect him. I think that he decided correctly because there is no space for insults on the football field.

I do not know his attitude towards different things. However I think that his behaviour is great and he is a good son, partner and friend. Like I said before his behaviour is probably different at home than on the football ground, because at home everybody knows him and does not insult him, while during matches players are not always friendly to each other.

He is a great player and a wonderful person. On the playground he would do everything for his team and he would help other players if they are injured. So his coach and co players can trust him and young people all over the world admire him.

## Fair Play - Slovenia

The phrase *fair play* is very often used in the context not at all connected with sport like in family life, student-teacher relationship, friendship, politics and so on.



- ...family life: Family members should share their work. Housekeeping should be done by all of the house members. They should respect each other. And if everybody respects everybody then your relationship in family is good.

- ...world: If the whole world was fair, then there would be no poor and no rich people. There would be probably only one foreign language to learn, such as Esperanto. I wish this could be true, but it's far from reality. People just aren't fair enough to do it.
